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ach of the twelve primary signs of the Zodiac is further subdivided into three ten-degree sections called decanates. The decanates enjoy a primary influence from their mother sign, and a secondary influence from each of the signs that shares the same element as that sign. Hence, the first decanate of the third sign, *Ursa Minor*, is termed *Gemini-Gemini*, as it is found within the primary sign Gemini, and enjoys a secondary influ-

ence of the first Air sign, which is also Gemini. The Keyword for this decanate is *Intuition*, and it extends from May 21 to May 31 of each year.

As explained above, the decanates are subordinate

very well-known children's story, "Goldilocks and the Three Bears," is told for the first Decanate of Gemini, whose key word is Intuition and represented in the sky by the constellation Ursa Minor. Previous versions of this tale did not depict a young girl as the protagonist, but rather a fox or a not very nice old woman. The bears were also originally described as three bachelors and not a nuclear family.

Nowadays, we'd likely view Goldilocks as a juvenile delinquent since she went into someone's house uninvited, ate their food and broke the furniture. It is apparent though that Goldilocks did not intend mischief but was instead exhibiting an impulsive curious nature, thoughtlessly unaware that intruding into someone's space may actually cause harm. In California, it could also be considered as turnabout is fair play since every year there are news stories about bears breaking into people's homes and eating all the food out of the refrigerator and cabinets.

The key phrase we remember from this story is that something was just right, a concept that is recognized as the Goldilocks Principle in many scientific disciplines. That is, given a set of options, one of them is right. The most well-known example of this principle is used in astrobiology, where the Goldilocks Zone is the habitable region around a star.

Like Goldilocks, we sometimes stumble into situations that we may later look back on as a "What was I thinking?" moment. Unlike her though, we don't usually have the option of jumping out of the window and running home to safety. Two of the bears in this story represent Reason and Intuition, but Zain interestingly dubs the third bear as Impulse. This bear is inimical to the others. Reason and Intuition fly out the window when impulse overtakes us. The taming of impulse and the application of reason and intuition is a life-long discipline we cultivate with our studies. Only through this do we ascertain the just right way of living a life devoted to contributing our utmost.

The last star in his tail is the North Star, Polaris, the nightly guide used by those who travel by night in the Northern Hemisphere. Polaris never moves, just as Intuition, the key word for this decanate, never leaves us.

Those people who come into this world with planets/luminaries/etc., in the Gemini-Gemini decanate have all sorts of special gifts and talents. Use our 21 Courses to research these in your natal horoscopes. Here we are examining the impact that this Little Bear has on our eternal souls. After all, the Intuition we have and use rightly in our lives goes with us as we develop our spiritual bodies.

Gemini, ruled by Mercury, governs thought. The duality of the twins relates to the split in consciousness into our objective conscious and the unconscious minds. Little Bear represents the unconscious. The conscious mind reasons and thinks and is mortal. It dies when we die. The unconscious lives in the ether and has come with us from our lower life forms as instinct. As we are now human, it has developed into INTUITION.

Think about the Collective Unconscious as described by Jung. All that has been, is now, and ever will be is held there. Our unconscious minds exist there in the place we call the higher levels of consciousness, the realms of spirit we occupy after we leave this Earth.

We have all had experiences where we intuitively feel that some event in particular will happen, or that in order to achieve success we need to behave in a certain way. In our studies with Hermetic Philosophy, we begin to see an increase in these happenings if we are paying attention. It comes with the territory. When we study the Little Bear; we become consciously aware of why it happens, and how in learning to develop our intuition the instances of knowing become more frequent and are dependable.

that the way to develop intuition is by learning to trust our intuition by actively engaging the unconscious mind. We do this as we learn more about active dreaming and are able to ask questions or petition for help with a problem before we sleep. We can also engage the unconscious mind through the practice of meditation, petition (another word for prayer), and reflection to gather what we already know.

Many neophytes say: "Oh I tried all that, it just doesn't work." Know that it's a practice which starts small and develops slowly. Be still for one minute, three minutes, 10 seconds. Use music, don't use music. Get a guide, don't get a guide. Just do it! This practice gives us a greater awareness of our own ways in which we resist. We must begin by learning to quiet the mind and concentrate. The Little Bear, Intuition, will show us how to find our way to our own Truth, our own special practice.

Daily practice of meditation, including prayer and reflection, is a key to touching the Pole Star. My truth today is that when I started this daily practice a few years ago after a lifetime of trying to meditate, intuition changed from an occasional event that happens into a conscious asking and knowing that the information/inspiration sought will manifest. This is an active seeking through the work of stillness and quiet. Each one of us develops a process. Within the reflective component, we find there is a certain something that happens individually just before we get an intuitive thought. One friend gets a bump, another gets a godwink, for me it's sort of a tap of my

shoulder. It's subtle. It takes practice to recognize, but if we are consistently practicing, it works. As we gain clarity through our connection with Intuition through prayer, meditation, and reflection, each of learns to recognize when we are receiving guidance in the form of intuition through meditation. It is truly our right and our duty not only to do this, but to serve others by sharing with them how to use their Intuition that we may all grow together in Universal Love and Welfare. As we surrender within this process is when the results are known. "When the unconscious mind realizes what is expected of it, it will endeavor to meet the expectations.... Only through training can its voice be heard.... Only through training can its voice be heard." It is the objective mind which must be trained to recognize what has been given. If we can trust the process, the results are as sure as the North Star.

in their influence to the signs themselves. Similarly, in interpreting and explaining the symbolism of each decanate, they nearly always relate back to their mother sign in terms of their overarching value and meaning. If you will recall, as the third sign of the Zodiac and as the first Air sign, Gemini is archetypically the sign of the mind. It communicates the ancient conception of the mind as dual in nature (i.e., rational, conscious mind and intuitive, unconscious mind), and details the essential relationship between our thoughts, feelings, and behaviors.

Accordingly, all three of the decanates found within Gemini elucidate particular aspects of the mind. The first decanate of Gemini is called *Ursa Minor*, which translates from Latin as "The Little Bear." This constellation is very well known to even casual observers of the night sky, for


also known as the North Star or the Pole Star. The Pole Star is famous for appearing to stand nearly still in the night sky while all other stars turn about it, since it is located very close to the north celestial pole. People have relied on the constancy and predictability of *Polaris* to guide them to safety for millenia, whether to steer them on the seas or across vast deserts (McClure, 2019).

In order to fully appreciate the ancient fascination with constancy and immutability, it is worthwhile to explore their concept of reality itself. Interestingly, the ancient Greek notion of reality was diametrically opposed to our own. In our modern, technologically based, highly materialistic culture, reality is largely defined as that which can be empirically observed or experienced by the physical senses. We define something as real

when we can see, touch, or feel it; we often entertain skepticism regarding its reality if it is intangible, incorporeal, or otherwise unable to be directly observed. However, as Nichomachus of Gerasa (n.d., p. 1) explains in Introduction to Arithmetic, Pythagoras defined an object as real "when it

continues to exist uniformly without change." According to this definition of

it is synonymous with The Little Dipper constellation. Importantly, the very tip of the tail of Ursa Minor comprises *Polaris*,

reality, no material object can be considered fully real, as our physical world is constantly undergoing change and reorganization. Hence, in order to discover something of greater reality, Pythagoras and other, like-minded philosophers advised that we look to the nonphysical world of thoughts and their idealized notions, a concept which Plato described as The Realm of Forms (Wilkerson & Cummings, 2015). To these ancient Greek philosophers, Forms were perfect, unchanging, abstract concepts untouched by the erosive forces of space

and time. In this sense, then, they comprised a greater, more complete and perfectly intact reality than anything which can be achieved in our material universe.

Beginning from this notion of reality as that which exists uniformly without change, we can appreciate the importance of Polaris in the minds of the ancients. It is constant, steady, reliable, and predictable, and represents in that sense the Rock of Ages, even unto Deity, which is also characterized by Its constancy, perfection, and imperviousness

to the wasting forces of the material universe. Hence, in the minds of the ancients, the constancy of the spiritual realm was associated with absolute reality, while the changeable, mutable world of the material realm represented, at best, a relative reality which could approach but never achieve the perfection of the World beyond the world.

In the myth associated with The Little Bear, we are admonished to rightly regard the nature of reality as our ancient brothers and sisters understood it. The Little Bear represents intuition, a form of intelligence based on the (often unconscious) exercise of our inner senses.

Similarly, The Great Bear, which represents the third decanate of Gemini, symbolizes the complementary mental faculty of reason, which relies upon our external senses to interpret, understand, and make sense of the physical world.

The tale which best epitomizes the symbolism of The Little Bear is one beloved by billions of children the world over: Goldilocks and the

Three Bears. One day, a sweet, innocent girl named Goldilocks was wandering through the forest. She came upon a cottage belonging to three bears. As the door was unlocked and she was tired from her jaunt in the woods, she cautiously looked inside. Seeing no one home, as a child might be wont to do, she made her way inside to explore this possible resting place. On the table, she found three bowls of porridge. The porridge in the big bowl was too hot; the porridge in the medium bowl was too

cold; but the porridge in the little bowl was *just right*. Famished from her walk, she quickly scarfed it down.


Now full from her snack, she looked for a place to rest her sore feet. She found three chairs in the living room. She tried the big chair, but it was too hard; next, she tried the medium chair, but it was too soft; finally, she tried the little chair, and it was just right. Resting her feet convinced her that perhaps she needed a little nap before making her way home, so she headed up the stairs to the bedrooms. The big bed was too hard; the medium bed was too soft, but the wee bed was just right, and she fell fast asleep. Coming home from their own walk in the woods, the three bears discovered the strange girl in their home. When Goldilocks realized what she had done, she ran from the house as quickly as her feet could carry her.

The story of Goldilocks and the Three Bears is the story of the faculties and capacities of the human mind. According to the ancient conception, the human mind is dual, comprising an objective, rational portion and a subjective, intuitive portion. Objective consciousness depends upon reason in order to interpret relative reality as expressed in the material world, whereas subjective consciousness depends upon intuition in order to make sense of absolute reality as reserved for the spiritual world. Hence, both reason and intuition are forms of intelligence which human beings can rely upon in order to understand and make sense of their complex environment. However, owing to their unique natures, reason is best relegated to forays in the physical world, while intuition allows us to make sense of a deeper, invisible reality experienced only in the spiritual world. This is to say that in the same manner that we have physical senses to interpret our physical world, metaphysicians assert

that we have spiritual senses to make sense of the spiritual world that interpenetrates our material universe. Put another way, just as a physical scientist relies upon observation, experimentation, and the process of reason to make sense of the physical world, human beings employ the form of intelligence known as intuition in order to access sources and forms of understanding which are recondite to the strictly material scientist. However, to rely on one of these two forms of intelligence to the exclusion of the other is folly; were a scientist to rely strictly on reason without the benefit of intuition, her reasoning is "too hard", and she can easily be guilty of losing sight of the big picture. On the other hand, those who rely completely on intuition without checking their impressions against the essential faculty of reason are "too soft", and can easily be guilty of leading themselves or others irresponsibly or even dangerously off track. Therefore, the healthiest, most effective manner in which to make sense of our human experience, which comprises both physical and spiritual aspects, is to balance reason and intuition, and to always rely on one to check the other. This practice hearkens back to the porridge, chair, or bed in our fable that was "just right", thereby allowing us to make the best sense of our environment and to live most well, in that it accumulates inner knowledge from the spiritual world as well as outer knowledge from the material world.

The Leading Text for Ursa Minor is: "Only Through the Intuition Does Man Contact the Real Underlying Truth of Things" (Zain, 1997, p. 75). The only manner in which to truly understand this aphorism is to first apprehend the ancient conception of reality. As the an-

cients conceived of reality as being that which exists uniformly without change, the perfect, unblemished spiritual Forms which establish models for our imperfect, approximate material world are in this sense more real and substantial than our physical surroundings. As the type of intelligence associated with the immortal, unconscious mind, intuition acts as the gateway through which we can not only reason and hypothesize about this greater reality, but directly experience it, just as the tail of The Little Bear contacts the Pole Star – the representation of constancy, support, and permanence in the heavens. The Little Bear – restless, naive, playful, and curious - depicts the mental faculty of intuition, a form of intelligence that allows us to expand our capacities to understand and most effectively reside in a universe comprising both spiritual and physical dimensions.





OCCULT SIGNIFICANCE OF JUPITER

Gupiter is the "Greater Benefic" whose favor brings gifts, blessings and good luck generally. He is ample and expansive in nature, the planet of giving and receiving, the jolly, genial fellow who has good-will for all. His symbol is the cross

of matter surmounted by the crescent of soul. The fact that the crescent is above the cross shows that he puts the higher mind above the purely physical and materialistic.

In Ancient Masonry


Jupiter is Secretary of the Grand Lodge above. He sits in the

south of the lodge-room, the region of warmth and radiation. His duty is to observe the Worshipful Master's will and pleasure, record the proceedings of the lodge and to transmit a copy of the same to the Grand Lodge if so required. He is to receive all money and money-bills from the brethren, pay them to the

Treasurer and take receipts for all these transactions. His human function is the etheric body which should ever be ready to obey the commands of the Master (the ego) and to transmit all states of consciousness from the physical to the astral form, all thoughts, sensations and emotions being retained as modes of motion in the astral body. The money and mon-



The ordinary affairs of the kitchen could hardly get along without a liberal supply of tin cups, dippers, pie-pans, bread-pans, pails and other useful culinary equipment. Tin foil is pure tin hammered and rolled into sheets and is much used in wrapping confections.

Tin pipes are used in soda fountains as they will not corrode. Tin is used to make bronze, solder and other alloys and is used extensively to cover other metals. (How like Jupiter this is-covering the imperfections of another with kindness and brotherly love.) It is a mistake to think that tin rusts. It does not occur too abundantly in nature and only a thin coating is used over some other metal such as sheet iron. When the tin wears off it is the metal underneath that shows rust. The greatest weakness or fault of tin, especially as applied spiritually, is its low melting point. The desire of Jupiter to be a good sport and generous may lead to dissipation. The natural flux for tin is quicksilver, and the spiritual antidote for Jupiter is Mercury which teaches us that wealth in any form should be balanced by thought, religion by science, and generosity by discretion.

In Mental Alchemy



Jupiter rules the Religious urges. Thoughts of devotion, obedience to law, kindness, free-heartedness and the desire to make others happy all come under the rule of this most benefic planet.

In Mundane Astrology

Jupiter rules, in thought, religion and philosophy; in business, finance and commerce; in politics, capitalism. As ruler of the ninth house he rules the laws, courts and jurisdiction. As having to do with long journeys, he rules imports and exports, the things that come to us from far countries and the things which we have to spare to send abroad. Jupiter is ever the salesman who sells at a profit, always making for increase and enlargement. Banking, merchandising and raising of revenue all belong to Jupiter.


In Natal Astrology

The two benefics, Jupiter the greater and Venus the lesser, can make a lot of trouble when square or opposite each other.



When Mars afflicts Jupiter we find enforced charities that fail of their purpose. Too much treating of the social class comes in here. Jupiter discordant to the Sun makes it hard for the person to do the right thing and to maintain his honor and credit in getting out of the many jams he is sure to get into. Happy is such a one if he knows how to apply astrology to his difficulties. In disease Jupiter gives growths and tumors, quite in keeping with his nature since he here gives increase but in the wrong way. In physical anatomy he rules the arterial system and the liver. The natural remedy is proper diet.

In Stellar Healing


When imparting Jupiter vibrations the flowing color visualized should be a rich






Jupiter corresponds to Major Arcanum V., The Hierophant. Here we see the master of the sacred mysteries sitting between two columns of the temple. These symbolize divine law and the power to obey or disobey. At his brow is the sacred serpent of enlightenment. At his feet two men are kneeling. One is white, personifying Good; the other, black, personifying Evil, and from both of these he commands obedience as shown by the sign of the pentagram which he makes with his right hand. His left hand leans upon a cross of three bars-the triple Tau-which is the emblem of the divine fire penetrating the three worlds, spiritual, astral and physical. In Divination, Arcanum V. is read as Religion or Law. The corresponding number is 5; the letter, E, and the occult science, Spiritual Astrology.







Associated with Jupiter through his daysign, Sagittarius, is Major Arcanum VII., The Conqueror. Here we see a war chariot over which is a starry canopy supported by four pillars (representing the four quadrants of heaven.) Within the chariot rides the conqueror wearing a cuirass or breastplate (signifying resistance) upon which is traced a T-square (signifying virile force) and two try squares, indicating the ability to turn this force to right or left as need requires. The sacred serpent is at his brow. From his crown rise three pentagrams, or golden five-pointed stars. He holds aloft in his right hand a sword, symbol of victory over the physical world. In his left hand he holds a scepter surmounted by a square, a circle, and a triangle, denoting dominion over matter, spirit and mind. On the front of the chariot is a winged sphere, emblem of the immortal flight of the soul. A white and

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black sphinx harnessed to the car denote good and adverse periods. This card is read as Victory. The corresponding number is 7, the letter Z, and the occult science Masonry.

Arcanum XII


Until the discovery of Neptune, Jupiter was considered to be the ruler of the night-sign Pisces which corresponds to Major Arcanum XII., The Martyr. This card is read as Sacrifice or Expiation. Here we see a man hanging by one foot from a gallows stretched between the trunks of two trees, the six branches of each having been cut off. His hands are

tied together and from them drop pieces of gold money. One leg, bent at the knee, forms a cross with the other leg, and below the cross the legs form a triangle. This is an entirely materialistic ensemble, showing that physical forces have gained supremacy over the mind, that energy is wasted and life is ebbing away. We must look elsewhere for the spiritual survival of the values here represented. The number of this Arcanum is 12, the letter L, and the occult science, Organic Alchemy. For a fuller explanation of these Arcana see lessons 25, 26 and 28.





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
