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The Sacred Hebrew Alphabet: Taw -And the Last Shall be First

t is fitting and proper that, through no deliberate effort, the composition of this last of 24 independent articles on the Hebrew Alefbayt (AB) falls on Easter Sunday of the year 2,019 C.E. On a day that has symbolized since time immemorial renewal and rebirth, both as adopted by Christians, and also pre-dating Christian theology as the celebration of lshtar, this series of articles finds its conclusion. Still, as the twenty-second and final letter of the AB will amply demonstrate, in the minds of the Ancients, every ending was in fact a new beginning. As the death and decomposition of one organism into soil makes way for the nourishment and sustenance needed for the birth and survival of the next generation, so also does the final letter of the AB symbolize completion, as well as a new cycle of manifestation and development.

The Kabbalists classified the letter Taw as a *lingual* conso-

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The Grand Cross

The Order of the Sphinx is engaged in a study group, rereading and discussing^{*} the 21 books written by C.C. Zain. Just now we are reading *Spiritual Alchemy*, which is clearly one of my favorites. This morning I read: "...if the soul so desires, and will put forth the effort, it can move forward continuously to become a more effective workman in the realization of God's Great Plan" (Zain II-44). Having spent the last month researching, considering, and imagining the implications of the subject of this article, The Grand Square (aka The Grand Cross), the words above have taken on special meaning.

It is rare to find a Grand Cross aspect in a horoscope. I have known a couple people

with a Grand Square, have heard stories about others, and have read recently about three in particular: Steve Jobs, Miles Davis, and Jennifer Lawrence (Google, Grand Square). This article is a combination of conversations with others, general reading, hours of meditation on this topic. The result is some very interesting observations and realizations about the spiritual impact of this aspect.

The basic Grand Square is composed of at least four planets (MC & ASC being included as planets) of which two are in opposition

"Permanence, perseverance, and persistence in spite of all obstacles, discouragement, and impossibilities: It is this, that in all things distinguishes the strong soul from the weak." - Thomas Carlyle

Most all of us will at some time in our life be faced with obstacles and adversity. An obstacle can be defined as anything that obstructs or hinders our progress. Adversity is described as difficulties or misfortune. We can all probably agree that at one time or another we've experienced some of each.

During the early to mid-80's, I had the opportunity to work with an art therapist who had studied the Jungian method in Switzerland. She introduced me to the written works of the great mythographer, Joseph Campbell, beginning with "The Hero with a Thousand Faces". In this illuminating tome, Campbell explores the common themes of folklore, fairytales and world myth. He describes a journey of the archetypal hero who ventures forth to win a decisive victory over obstacles and adversity. The pattern of the Hero myth is that the protagonist often gains a special power or "boon" that s/he brings back for the benefit of the community.

These epic stories have continued to engage the human imagination for millennia because they speak to the minor acts of heroism that each of us performs daily when we successfully meet and overcome our own obstacles. Mythological obstacles might include cyclops, fire-breathing dragons or Herculean tasks, all which make our daily trials and tribulations appear insignificant.

Most of us who have been drawn to the study of astrology were originally attracted to the discipline as a means of gaining greater self-awareness. Part of that greater self-awareness is looking for the patterns of conflict in our lives and searching for solutions to mitigate them. Generally, these are the areas of our life where we experience our greatest obstacles and adversities.

Sometimes these obstacles are external events that are beyond our control. Perhaps we live in an environment beset with natural disasters such as fires, floods, earthquakes, droughts or pestilence. For other persons, our adversities might be societal, such as institutionalized racism or misogyny, economic recessions or pandemics.

Some obstacles are internal and might include wanting to experience improvements and advances in our income, health or relationships. Internal obstacles might also include habitual trends of thought, feeling or behavior usually stemming from fear (Saturn) or anger (Mars) and which repeatedly create conflicts in our lives.

Regardless of whether our obstacles are external or internal, they can only be surmounted when we are willing to take heroic measures and change our habit-


and making a square to two others which are in opposition. Obviously, other planets within orb of conjunctions with these planets become involved in the Grand Square. Let me offer you a visual that came as a result of meditating on this. When we see this aspect on paper, it is often marked on the chart with a separate color but only as a flat, two-dimensional image. Consider what it would look like by adding the declinations and putting it into motion as it would have been in the sky at the time of birth. What I see is the potential of a giant cube surrounding the native soul, with all the potential

of the energies to be used in the realization of spiritual consciousness and connection with the Divine Source.

There is no doubt that this is the most difficult aspect. Each of the points in the Grand Square always represent the separate agenda of each point demanding attention. They present a never-ending series of choices, challenges, conflicts, and stubborn inflexibility. Planets represented will almost always be in signs of the same quality: movable, mutable, fixed; but will mostly be in separate elements: fire, earth, air, and water. The Grand Square planets will also likely all

be placed in either angular, succedent, or cadent houses. The plot thickens. So many choices make for some very interesting outcomes.

Every single source I read says the same thing: these divergent energies create people who ultimately either focus on single goals, ideas, and strategies to accomplish things in life; or they stay distracted, disjointed and isolated. Imagine the spiritual impact of that idea! Astrologer Carl Wolbcke has written about the impact of the Grand Square in each quality. In the Grand Square, planets in movable signs may have problems accomplishing goals because the speed of action prohibits completion being too scattered, so the antidote is for the native to change or stop the way they go after things; the solution is to be more deliberate. Planets in mutable signs will have trouble maintaining focus in communication, often changing their minds and depending too much on the actions and reactions of others; their resolution lies in their ability to see all sides of things. Fixed planets are

often too emotional so even though organized, the energy lacks direction and gets bogged down. Learning to humble the will when acting will allow for greater success.

To further our knowledge of the Grand Square, let us apply the same process we have learned in our prior adventures with aspects. As mentioned, this aspect is rare in our natal charts, but we may have had one in the past or one coming up by major, minor, or transiting progression. A Grand Square by even transiting progression is an amazing source of energy to be used for our spiritual work. Being aware of this potential is very

> important and will be an interesting topic of discussion this summer at the June Convention, I hope.

Let us begin this process with the Grand Square in the natal horoscope and then in the progressed chart. For this aspect write in the following information: Planet/sign/ house/element/etc., for each point of the Grand Square, then also note which planet in the aspect is the stronger, as this will be the point where the aspect will draw the most energy and attention.

Engage in a specific activity, as in writing, sculpture, collage, drama, to help see how they all manifest in your life. As with other as-

pects, a great activity will be to create an actual dialogue between the planets in the signs and houses in which they describe themselves and how they feel being in relationship with their partners in this aspect. Write this dialogue down or at least record it in your spiritual journal. Meditate carefully on the Grand Square for more inspiration as to how its usefulness in your spiritual growth. Look in *The Sacred Tarot, Cs. VI*, for inspiration on the crosses represented in Arcana IV and XII.

Repeat this process for each Grand Square applying in the natal and progressed horoscopes. To ensure greater success with the Grand Square, work particularly with the terminal of the aspect that has the most harmony by astrodynes. This planet then becomes the place of balance for the Grand Square.

nant, hinting at its deeper linguistic value. Linguals are one of the five classes of consonants in the AB. In order from most covert to overt, they are: gutturals, palatals, linguals, dentals, and labials. As has been explicated many times over during this series of articles, the author sees in these classifications potential phonosemantic links, such that the articulatory placements of the letters correspond to their linguistic symbolisms and values. Con-

sonants produced deep in the vocal tract, invisible and unseen, correspond to the unseen elements of the universe, namely the spiritual aspects of creation. Conversely, those speech sounds produced most superficially at the lips (i.e., labials) correspond to the most manifest aspects of nature, namely material objects and phenomena. Existing at an interface between them, we find in the lingual consonants an apt analogy for the mental aspects of creation, as the intermediary between the spiritual and material elements of the universe.

Fittingly, we find in the name of the final letter of the AB, Taw, an exact representation of this triune nature of the universe. The first letter, /t/, is a *lingual*, pronounced in the center of the vocal tract, and therefore corresponds to the *mental* plane. The vowel, /a/, is the very first letter of the AB. It is a *guttural* consonant, produced deep in the throat, and therefore represents the primacy of the *spiritual* aspects of creation. Finally, /w/ is a *labial*, pronounced at the lips, and completes the symbolism of Taw by representing the *material* aspects of creation. Hence, in the seemingly unremarkable word *Taw*, we find a deliberately constructed symbol of the triune nature of the universe, with a concomitant representation of the spiritual, mental, and material aspects of existence.

According to Kaplan (1997), the word *Taw* means "cross", and this symbolism is also apropos, as the cross has been used since time immemorial to represent a state of balance and order as regards the three main

elements of creation. The astronomical symbol of the

earth, Θ , which is a cross inside a circle, demonstrates the three aspects of creation in perfect symmetry and balance. The circle represents the infinite, unchanging, immutable quality of *spirit*. The horizontal line represents the mundane element of *matter*, while the vertical line represents the inward, aspiring aspects of character and *mentality*. In the physical relationship represented by the cross, these three composite ele-

> ments of the universe are arranged in perfect balance and harmony. One might see in such a symbolism the concept that at its heart, the purpose of the universe is to help God's children discover a similar state of physical, mental, and spiritual harmony. Of course, this is much easier said than done, and so represents a very worthy target regardless of one's present point of development along the path enlightenment and to knowledge. Indeed, the person who proclaims that they are "enlightened" is by that very same statement impugned, in that enlighten-

ment is a *journey* as opposed to a *destination*. If we are to take any cues from nature, it is that she is in constant pursuit of greater development and growth, and we, being part of nature, must fall quite in line with this same precept.

In a manner similar to our analysis of the letters that constitute the word Taw, there is another Ancient Hebrew (AH) word equally worthy of consideration. In The Wisdom in the Hebrew Alphabet, Rabbi Munk dedicates nearly his whole chapter on the letter Taw to the concept of Emet, or Truth (In AH, Emet is spelled Aleph -Mem-Taw). Having analyzed all the letters of the AB through a phonosemantic lens, we are now in a position to more deeply understand what appears to be the deliberate construction of the AH word Emet. The first letter, Aleph, is the first letter of the AB, a guttural produced deep in the throat, and as such represents spirit.

ual behaviors in thought, feelings, speech and actions. To do so we must first be able to identify the source of our difficulties. In an astrological chart these patterns in consciousness are mapped out by the relationships (aspects) between planets as they are colored by the sign and house positions they occupy. The birth chart offers us the map of our character, consciousness, habitual behaviors and the events and experiences we attract. The techniques for altering our deepestheld habits are Alchemical conversion and transmutation, which can be studied in Courses III, IX, XIV and XXI of The Brotherhood of Light Lessons.

The simplified version of the "Hero's Journey" describes the process in three stages: Departure, Initiation and Return. These stages also apply succinctly to those of us who step out on a journey of spiritual selfdiscovery. The departure is when we become aware of the mundane thralldom of our lives and choose to pursue a higher calling. Initiation is the trials and tribulations we encounter on our spiritual pilgrimage (which include our internal or external conflicts) and the teacher or the teaching that may illumine us and transforms our course in life. Part of that initiation is receiving a "boon" a blessing or beneficial insight, discovery or "ah-ha" moment. The return is when we arrive back to the place of origin, the family or community bearing our boon or gift of transformation that changes us and those around us.

The philosophical conundrum, especially when we are deeply suffering, is usually "why me, God?" Eastern philosophies teach that it is that our suffering is due to misdeeds performed in previous lives. And for those who subscribe to Western Orthodoxies, the suffering is seen as a purgation (which along with the belief in Jesus as one's personal savior) will be what determines one's placement in an afterlife. Hermetic philosophy looks at obstacle, adversities, struggles and challenges through an educational model. That we are here on earth in human form (Life) to grow in compassion (Love) and wisdom (Light). As we learn to successfully meet our conflicts and overcome our obstacles, we develop greater abilities which allow us to fulfill our destiny in God's Great Plan. It is through having experiences that challenge us that we develop our abilities. This gives us a whole new perspective of looking at astrological charts where we will no longer shrink in horror from Squares and Oppositions. In a conversation several years ago with a psychiatrist client, I was

describing these energies in her chart. To which she responded, "oh, you mean another AFGO!" "AFGO," I replied in surprise, "what's that?" "Another – Freaking – Growth – Opportunity" was her response. Since that day I have looked at Squares and Oppositions in a chart through the window of the acronym "AFGO." It has altered my perspective.

Among the many great reads in in The Brotherhood of Light series, I find "Occultism Applied" to be one of my favorite books. It offers techniques for successfully meeting and overcoming the obstacles and adversities of our lives – our conflicts both internal and external.

My fixation in this editorial on obstacles is inspired by the fact that this issue of the Quarterly is dedicated to the "Grand Cross" in astrology. This aspect is known to be the most challenging of astrological configurations and is comprised of four or more planets that are forming four Squares (90 degrees) and two oppositions (180 degrees). They are seen in a horoscope as an equilateral cross.

The Grand Cross represents a multitude of desires in conflict with one another and competing with one another for expression. The intensity of the conflict symbolized by the Grand Cross can be further defined by the state of activity the planets are in, be they Moveable, Fixed or Mutable signs. When in the Moveable (Cardinal) Signs of Aries, Cancer, Libra and Capricorn, each Element (Fire, Water, Air and Earth) is in its most active or gaseous state. The dynamic tensions expressed come through being rash, impulsive, daring and lacking the patience to bring things to completion. When in the Mutable Signs of Gemini, Virgo, Sagittarius and Pisces, where each element is in its liquid form, the issues can come from being too yielding or accommodating and seeking a path of least resistance. And when in the Fixed Signs of Taurus, Leo, Scorpio and Aquarius the elements express through their most solid form, the conflicts stem from being too rigid, unyielding, brittle or inflexible.

In my life I have attracted several friends over the years who have Grand Crosses in their charts, who I perceive as being both fascinating and frustrating. These friends certainly make my life more interesting, and simultaneously they can make life more tense or dramatic than I prefer it to be. The conscious person, who is devoted to techniques for personal growth can

The second letter, Mem, is a labial consonant, articulated at the lips, and so represents matter. Finally, the letter Taw, as amply discussed here, is the final letter of the AB and a lingual consonant produced in the middle of the articulatory tract, and thus represents the mental plane. Taken together, the letters yet again represent a state of symmetry, order, and balance between the three fundamental elements of creation. Hence, the construction of the AH word for Truth. Emet. stands in as a symbol itself of truth, in that it represents a unified. southerly symmetric relationship between the three prime elements of the universe: spirit, matter, and mind. Further supporting this analysis is the fact that the three letters that comprise the AH word Emet are the first, middle, and last letters of the AB. Hence, we see not only a symmetry and order regarding the basic elements of the universe, but also a positional symmetry which accounts for all of the letters of the AB, as well as the archetypes they represent, within a neat and tidy package of three letters. That, my friends, is a word worthy of representing *Truth*.

In the minds of the Ancient Kabbalists, every ending brought with it a state and sense of completion, but also planted the seed of a new beginning. A mature plant has not fulfilled its mission until it has gone to seed, laying out the conditions for the next generation to rise where it will ultimately fall. Similarly, the letter Taw is the capstone that completes and unites the Alefbayt. And yet, it can also be seen as the cornerstone of a new and grand edifice built upon the strength and structure of the old.

A square provides a solid base. Those objects around us that are immovable are firmly anchored on four sides. For

our spiritual growth we face every aspect, every event in our life with determination and love, accepting that which has been given to us as a part of the Divine Plan. Going back to Spiritual Alchemy, Zain speaks clearly about all that we have available to us for fulfilling our part in the Cosmic Body and in the Divine Plan. For this to occur, we must use all the tools and energy available at any given time. The lesson of the Grand Square is that great adversity creates greatness. To succeed in this life and the next demands a reliance on that which we have no knowledge: faith in the Hermetic principles and the knowledge that we have been blessed with a guide for our own potential in this work: our natal and progressed horoscopes. As bizarre as it seems, the aspect that looks like it may be the worst, may be the best as far as teaching us the importance of focus, faith, humility, and willingness.


